The Sales Table is Back!

After a hiatus due to the pandemic, our sales table will be up and running again at the March General Meeting. Any plants offered for sale must have no signs of pests or diseases and should have a healthy root system and be secure in their pots. All plants offered for sale must have an OSWA plant sales tag attached, and to avoid the sales table descending into chaos, members selling plants must complete an OSWA Plant Sales sheet. OSWA will receive a commission of 10% on sales, but as an incentive to maintain membership, the commission will not be collected on sales by long-standing members (>5 years). CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (MARCH/APRIL 2021) based on notes from Roy Brown

This is the time of the year when the young flower spikes are starting to develop, and so a drop in the temperature during the evening is a vital part of the successful flowering of Cymbidiums. Turning on the overhead sprinklers in the early evening will drop the temperature by quite a few degrees, creating the ideal conditions necessary for the growing and flowering of our plants. Always have a good check of your pots regularly to make sure the drainage is not blocked. Water should pass through the compost freely, not just seep away. Keep the regular fertilizer programme going, as the new seasons growths need to be kept growing at a fast rate, so they will develop sufficiently to produce their flowers when the time comes. If you should be poking about in your plants looking for these early flower spikes during March, do be very careful, they are very easily broken or damaged. Should you have to move a plant that has definite signs of flower spikes showing, be very careful to replace it in the exact same position with the flower spike facing the same direction as before. This will minimise chances of the flower spike and buds twisting as they look for the sun. With the advent of flower spikes showing, it might be a good idea to give the shade house a general clean up, getting rid of all dead leaves, weeds and anything else that might harbour pests. Now is the time to also check that you have a good supply of pots and potting mix ready for those repotting jobs next month.

CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (MARCH/APRIL 2021) based on notes from Henry Eaton

Although March is technically the first month of autumn, we can still expect days when the temperature goes quite high and there is little, if any, rain around to increase the humidity. The light may be decreasing slightly, but the heat still requires that you maintain shading as for the summer months. Watering and fertilizing your plants will still follow a summer pattern, unless there is rain, when you can miss a watering if necessary. Cattleyas are plants that revel in a wet/dry cycle, where they like to dry out nearly fully before being watered again. You can gauge this by lifting up the pot after watering when it should feel heavy. The pot loses weight when drying out giving you the signal to re-water. At this time of the year, due to the cooler nights, check your plants after watering to make sure that no water has collected in between the upper leaves. This is essential, as at this time many plants will be producing flowering sheaths and buds and any water retained around them could cause rotting. If water has collected dry it up with a tissue. While attending to your plants also stake the pseudo bulb bearing the buds or sheaths erect, so that when the flowers emerge they will be pointing towards you and not any which way. If you move a plant to a flowering house out of the rain etc., make sure to leave the plant pointing in the same direction in which it was grown, otherwise the buds may open in an unsightly fashion.

PAPHIOPEDILUM CULTURAL NOTES (MARCH/APRIL 2021) by Trevor Burnett

Even though summer has officially finished, the summer pattern is still with us. We may still have some hot days over 34 °C to come, so we need to be mindful of this and adjust our watering accordingly. At this time of the year I water three times a week early in the morning with overhead sprinklers, so the plants are well saturated. This will allow time for the plant to dry out before the sun gets too high and will prevent any possibility of water burns. It will also ensure the plants are dry by nightfall. If excessive heat is forecast over consecutive days, you will need to watch plants in small pots and increase the watering as necessary. Watering is highly dependent on the composition of your potting mix and its ability to retain moisture. For beginners, a test pot of just potting mix in the growing area is recommended, until you understand the water holding capacity of your mix. You can empty the pot at any stage to see what water is retained. As the plants are still in active growth, keep a weak fertilizer program going (at $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ strength) on a weekly or fortnightly basis, depending on your time restraints. Ensure that you flush the mix with water between fertilising. In the glasshouse, the use of misting sprays under the benches will be beneficial by increasing the humidity levels on very hot days. It is equally important that plenty of fresh air, which is essential for the plants health, is available in the glasshouse. At this time of the year the paphiopedilum will have some leaves that have died over the summer months and these should be removed in preparation for the forthcoming flowering season, to prevent any unwanted vermin having an ideal hiding place. I would repot any small plants that are not expected to flower during this period, to ensure they have a nice clean mix before going into winter.

Plant descriptions: Ray Taylor presented on Dendrobium Gloster Charm – canaliculatum x lindleyi (partly Australian native). Ray grows these very high in his glass house with high humidity and lowers the plant as the spikes develop so they don't hit the roof! This plant has been in flower for > 12 months. Ray's medium is 1 part bark, 1 part perlite and half part gravel (blue metal works OK). Ray hand waters with a hose, and is lucky enough to have good quality rainwater.

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SELLING PLANTS AT OSWA SHOWS AND POTTING WORKSHOPS

What you need to do to sell plants:

- 1. Fill out and attach an OSWA plant sales tag to each plant you want to sell. Do not use tags from other clubs.
- 2. Fill out an OSWA Master Sales Sheet, and make sure the information matches what you wrote on the sales tags.
- 3. Bring your tagged plants and Master Sales Sheet to the sales table coordinator (or their representative), so that the paperwork can be checked. The plants will be made available for sale if the paperwork is correct and the plants are of a suitable standard, free of pests and diseases.

What else you need to know:

- 4. OSWA will not be held liable for any loss you incur if you supply plants to sell without first checking with the sales table coordinator to ensure paperwork is correct and plants are suitable for sale.
- 5. All plants exhibiting signs or symptoms of any pests or diseases will be removed from the sales table. There will be NO EXCEPTIONS to this rule. The plants will be quarantined out of sight. If there is a serious pest infestation, the plants may be removed from the venue entirely.
- 6. All plants must have a healthy root system and be secure in their pots, not wobbling or unsupported or in a pot of sludge. If the plant is presented in such a poor manner that you would not buy it yourself, don't try to put it on the sales table, because it will not be accepted.
- 7. There is a limit on the number of plants that can be sold no more than 15 plants per member at any one time. Plants may be replaced as they are sold, provided the replacement plants meet all relevant criteria set out above.
- 8. Additional conditions may be imposed by venues and must be adhered to (e.g., some venues might limit the number of orchids that can be sold per day).
- 9. Orchids have priority for sale. If you wish to sell other plants, please note that these may be placed off display until space is available on the sales table.
- 10. OSWA will retain 10% of every sale as a commission at shows and potting days.
- 11. Proceeds of sales will not be paid to sellers until at least the general meeting following the sales event.
